Vanishing Point

This feature documentary tells the story of 2 Inuit communities of the circumpolar north—one on Canada's Baffin Island, the other in Northwest Greenland—that are linked by a migration led by an intrepid shaman. Navarana, an Inughuit elder and descendant of the shaman, draws inspiration and hope from the ties that still bind the 2 communities to face the consequences of rapid social and environmental change and the different choices each community has made.

This film was directed by Steven Smith and Julia Szucs and is entirely in first person voice, narrated by Navarana in her language with English subtitles. The film is 82 minutes long.

FISHERIES MANAGER Permanent Full-time

The Fisheries Manager is responsible for the management, coordination and operational direction of the Musqueam Indian Band's Fisheries Department, including duties required by the AFS contract. As the Manager, the incumbent reports to the Divisional Lead, Intergovernmental Affairs on departmental issues related to the management of the fisheries department and staff. As well, the Manager advises the Musqueam Fisheries Commission on strategic issues related to the various fisheries and habitat management. The Manager represents the Musqueam Fisheries Commission at meetings and discussions with other governments and their agencies; with community boards; with the fishing industry; and with the media.

The Manager will oversee the budget and administrative operational matters of the Fisheries Department and reports to the Musqueam Fisheries Commission. The incumbent is responsible for the development of an annual departmental budget for Fisheries, administrating expenditures, and providing financial status reports to the Fisheries Commission, as well as fulfilling reporting requirements for contract agreements. The Manager ensures that the Fisheries Department administrative practices are consistent with the Musqueam Indian Band administrative policies.

Duties:

As a member of Musqueam Indian Band's Management Team:

- Provide overall direct and operational management to fisheries staff and ensure the daily operations within the Fisheries Department is accountable, runs smoothly and efficiently.
- Be proactive in representing Fisheries internally and externally on matters that relate to area of responsibility and enhancement of the environment.
- Maintain and manage all Fisheries Department budgets, administration, reporting, purchasing, insurance, inventory and records.
- Provide advice and technical information to the Commission to assist in the development of programs and/or policies required to address various fisheries issues.
- Develop and implement operational work plans related to the goals and objectives of the Musqueam Indian Band and the Fisheries Commission. Report to the Commission the status of the Department towards the assigned goals.
- Manage work direction of Musqueam Fisheries Departmental staff and independent consultants/contractors. Ensure that departmental administrative activities comply with administrative policies.
- Prepare and manage the Fisheries Department budget. Ensure that departmental expenditures comply with the approved budget.
- Develop and maintain effective working relationships with colleagues and outside governments, agencies, boards, industry, and media.
- Organize and facilitate community consultations and workshops
- Manage environmental specialists and/or technicians responsible for conducting technical work including environmental impact assessments, environmental effects monitoring, habitat assessment, habitat compensation and restoration planning

- Oversee the management of the "Salish Seas LP" (PICFI) assets inventory and carry out business plan direction. Maintain a positive relationships with existing Commercial Fishing Enterprise partners (\$150,000 Annual Budget, ~\$175,000 net revenue)
- Determine the need for consultants/contractors, initiate hiring/selection, and monitor the work of consultant and contractors
- Oversee environmental enhancement initiatives within Musqueam reserve lands and watersheds (Collaboration projects – Government to Government restoration focus 2014-2019 - \$700,000 annual budget), in collaboration with the Musqueam Capital Corporation, the operational Management of the First Nation Fisheries Legacy Fund (FNFLF)
- Develop and implement Musqueam Fisheries policies
- Performs other duties as required.

Job Knowledge:

- Skill and knowledge usually attained by a combination of relevant experience, education
 and knowledge in the area of Fisheries Aboriginal Rights, Habitat/Wildlife Management
 and/or Business Administration and/or an equivalent combination of skill, knowledge, and
 experience.
- Experience reporting to an elected Board or Commission would be preferred.
- Knowledge and experience of similar program delivery in the context of Musqueam or First Nations culture and history.
- Knowledge of Provincial and Federal Environmental Legislation and environmental impact assessments.
- Knowledge of the Pacific Integrated Commercial Fishing Initiative (PICFI)
- Strong understanding of the Integrated Fisheries Management Plan (IFMP)
- Knowledge of DFO policy.
- Development and operational business planning (Commercial Fishing focus)
- Ability to plan, organize and deliver an efficient and effective Fisheries Program.
- Ability to develop, and operate within annual departmental budgets.
- Ability to develop and deliver reports as required by contracts.
- Ability to use tact and good judgment in dealing with sensitive and complex issues.

- Ability to drive and provide a licensed vehicle for work purposes.

- Identify and execute against a range of PR opportunities, including identification of media opportunities
- Develop a calendar of PR opportunities for Musqueam
- Maintain and develop contacts within the Musqueam Indian Band
- Initiate and maintain contact with local, regional and national media
- Arrange interviews and news conferences when required
- Arrange for the representatives of the Musqueam Indian Band to attend events as requested
- Develop briefing materials, speaking notes, and kits for Musqueam representatives
- Arrange agenda and travel for Chief and Council and Musqueam representatives including itineraries and advances for events
- Produce correspondence on behalf of Chief and Council and Musqueam Indian Band when needed
- Assist in the preparation of brochures, reports, corporate content for newsletters, press releases and other material
- Assist with the organization with invitation mail outs and attendance for and including, meetings, events and open houses
- Document control of fact sheets, newsletters, brochures, handouts, etc.
- Surveillance and assembly of news content related to Musqueam Indian Band and Aboriginal Affairs and Interests





What does on-reserve matrimonial real property law mean to Musqueam?

Resolution of this issue is long overdue. Government bodies at all levels have consistently recommended legislative action.

Provincial laws protect the matrimonial real property interests and rights of both spouses during a relationship, or in the event of separation, divorce or death. However, on-reserve matrimonial interests or rights include a couple's family home and other matrimonial interests or rights, where either spouses or common-law partners live together.

In 1986, the Supreme Court of Canada ruled that courts cannot apply provincial family laws on reserves governed by the *Indian Act*, if doing so would alter individual interests in matrimonial real property on reserves.

- Many of the legal protections relating to matrimonial interests or rights that are applicable off reserves are not available to individuals on reserves; and
- The *Indian Act* is silent on this issue.

Through the 2012 ratification of the Musqueam Land Code, Musqueam Band Members voted to manage our own land and resources.

This means we are now in a position to make our own law on matrimonial real property. We need your input on this important issue.




