The networks of support include involving learners, their parents, and Elders wherever possible to provide students with a sense of purpose, place and identity. The Learning Facilitator role is to enhance, plan and provide direct student support services.

Duties:

- Coordinate/participate in Committee Network Planning with Elders, Vancouver Community College/Capilano University/Native Education College (VCC/Cap/NEC) Aboriginal Coordinators, parents, and student leaders;
- Planning projects such as extra-curricular activities, social inclusion learning projects that support student's sense of place;
- Make recommendations on Counseling Training for Learning Facilitators to enable Learning Facilitators to provide early intervention and referrals that would support the learner;
- Research and provide information on learning and career path planning, including occupational descriptions and regional labor market trends;
- Inform Committee Elders about Aboriginal learner career plans to enhance supports;
- Engage and recognize Aboriginal learner's parents/caregivers contribution to learner success;
- Network with schools and communities thorough visits and presentations;
- Establish Learner Recognition/Role Model motivation program for students that would inform/create awareness of learning path/career path planning;
- Work with VCC/Cap/NEC Aboriginal Coordinators to develop core Learning Facilitator resources information and materials and make recommendations on how to provide increased Aboriginal student support;
- Develop Handbooks for Learners and Parents;
- Liaise with Institutional faculty and staff to increase awareness of Committee services, share pedagogy research, and enhance teacher relations with Aboriginal learners;
- Make recommendations on the new Accountability Framework and statistical information which measure the progress made towards meeting the goals and objectives of the ASP;
- Make recommendations on opportunities to leverage community supports (prevention/intervention/support) and funding partnership to the Education Manager, including needs/gaps for transportation costs
- Tutor and support students enrolled in the MIB Adult Basic Education program

An evening with Johnny Mack

Join us for an evening with Nuu-chah-nulth legal scholar and UBC Professor Johnny Mack. His research demonstrates that while Indigenous political and legal practices and institutions are deeply rooted in an ancient history, they survive to this day and are as relevant now as they were when Europeans first arrived. However, colonial processes have thinned out these institutions and the theoretical and philosophical storied traditions rationalizing them. This has a disorienting affect, making it difficult to know how to appropriately modify and invigorate indigenous institutions and social practices so that they can effectively inform and order relations within the very different world that now surrounds them.

He has also looked at how the Aboriginal rights and title framework and contemporary treaty negotiations in Canada carry forward the momentum of earlier colonial policies by continuing to dispossess indigenous peoples of their land base and facilitating their reintegrating into the land as liberal democratic Canadians.





What does on-reserve matrimonial real property law mean to Musqueam?

Resolution of this issue is long overdue. Government bodies at all levels have consistently recommended legislative action.

Provincial laws protect the matrimonial real property interests and rights of both spouses during a relationship, or in the event of separation, divorce or death. However, on-reserve matrimonial interests or rights include a couple's family home and other matrimonial interests or rights, where either spouses or common-law partners live together.

In 1986, the Supreme Court of Canada ruled that courts cannot apply provincial family laws on reserves governed by the *Indian Act*, if doing so would alter individual interests in matrimonial real property on reserves.

- Many of the legal protections relating to matrimonial interests or rights that are applicable off reserves are not available to individuals on reserves; and
- The *Indian Act* is silent on this issue.

Through the 2012 ratification of the Musqueam Land Code, Musqueam Band Members voted to manage our own land and resources.

This means we are now in a position to make our own law on matrimonial real property. We need your input on this important issue.

Safe Drinking Water Monitor Program - Charlene Campbell-Wood

What are the main reasons to issue a Boil Water Advisory? If a boil water advisory is issued in your area it may be recommended by Health Canada as a result of any of the following reasons:

- 1. On evidence of conditions such as:
 - a) Unacceptable levels of disease-causing bacteria, viruses or parasites in the water system anywhere from the source to the tap; and
 - b) Unacceptable levels of turbidity.
- 2. These conditions can occur for many reasons, including:
 - a) Inadequate filtration and /or disinfection during treatment; and
 - b) Re-contamination during distribution.

As a precautionary measure issued to residents in a specific area when there is concern that microbiological contamination may exist, for example, local emergency repairs in the distribution system.

Saturday, February 13, 2016 Vancouver Aquarium 10:00 a.m. to 3 p.m.


Musqueam, Squamish and Tsleil Waututh are organizing a workshop for Elders and Youth to talk about the environment, and inform them about various projects impacting the water and lands in our territory.

We are stewards of ours lands and waters and we have a responsibility to protect and restore the environment. It is important that we come together and share our views about our interconnectedness to marine and land resources, the marine environment, and discuss the challenges we all face as a result of climate change and cumulative effects.

Musqueam is seeking **15 youth** and **15 elders** to attend this workshop on February 13, 2016 at the Vancouver Aquarium. The workshop will include lunch, transport and admission to the Vancouver Aquarium.



The Museum of Anthropology, the Musqueam First Nation, and the Museum of Vancouver partner on a groundbreaking exploration of an ancient landscape and living culture in a series of exhibitions entitled *cbsna?em, the city before the city.*

People often think of Vancouver as a new city, when in fact this region has been occupied for 9000 years. Located in the area now commonly known as the neighbourhood of Marpole in Vancouver, c'øsna?@m was first occupied almost 5000 years ago and became one of the largest of the Musqueam people's ancient village sites approximately two thousand years ago. Generations of families lived at what was then the mouth of the Fraser River, harvesting the rich resources of the delta.

Over the past 125 years, archaeologists, collectors, and treasure hunters have mined the cəsna?əm village and burial ground for artifacts and ancestral remains. The land has been given various names since colonialism, including Great Fraser Midden, Eburne Midden, DhRs-1, and Marpole Midden – a name under which it would receive designation as a National Historic Site in 1933. Today, intersecting railway lines, roads, and bridges to Richmond and YVR Airport obscure the heart of Musqueam's traditional territory, yet cəsna?əm's importance to the Musqueam

community remains undiminished.

The exhibition at MOA focuses on Musqueam identity and worldview. It highlights language, oral history, and the community's recent actions to protect c'asna?am. Rich in multi-media, it demonstrates Musqueam's continuous connection to their territory, despite the many changes to the land. Told from the first-person perspectives of Musqueam community members both past and present, it also seeks to replicate aspects of Musqueam ways of educating. cbsna?am, the city before the city at MOA will leave the visitor with a different understanding of the deep history of what is now known as Metro Vancouver.

The exhibition at the Musqueam Cultural Education Resource Centre & Gallery focuses on the sophistication of the Musqueam culture – past and present. It makes connections between the expertise of pre-contact knowledge-holders and contemporary professionals. The exhibition at the Museum of Vancouver draws connections between cəsna?əm artifacts, Indigenous ways of knowing, colonialism, heritage politics, cultural resilience, and contemporary Musqueam culture. It includes graphic and 3D modelling of maps and artifacts, original videography, family-friendly interactivity, and soundscapes blending traditional and modern sounds.



Kwantlen Polytechnic University (KPU) and TFN are collaborating to offer an 8 months handson learning program in farming and land management on a 20 acre farm school in Tsawwassen. You will learn the fine art of growing crops and starting a farm business. You will also learn about how to manage water and soils, tend to a range of indigenous plants, make medicine and preserve food, build greenhouses, operate farm machinery, do basic welding & carpentry and care for farm animals. The courses are taught by seasoned farmers, university professors and experienced tradespeople. There is a mix of classroom, hands-on learning and practicum all taking place on TFN lands.

After the program you are eligible to get a piece of land at the farm to start your own operation while being supported by farm staff and being able to use the tools and facilities.

There are no entrance requirements and everyone is welcomed to take the courses.
