All net is subject to inspection by Musqueam AFOs for compliance

Species and Quantity

The Fishery is limited to a harvest of: Chinook salmon

All efforts and attempts shall be made to return all non-target species including sockeye, steelhead and sturgeon to the water alive.

Use of Fish

Fish caught under this licence are for food, social and ceremonial purposes. Without prejudice to future agreements, regulations, sale of fish caught under this licence is not permitted.

Gear

Drift Nets on condition that:

- (i) Nets do not exceed a maximum of 50 fathoms or 300 feet in length and a maximum depth of 60 meshes & 8" Minimum Mesh Restriction with a 3 to 1 hang ratio
- (ii) Each Participant fishes only one net.
- (iii) Only one net is fished from any vessel.
- (iv) Each net is attended at all times by the Participant who is fishing the net.
- (v) No vessel fishing under the authority of this licence has on board, in a hung condition, any net that does not meet the conditions in (i) above.
- (vi) Spare nets on board a vessel actively fishing are kept in a stowed condition.

Set Nets on condition that:

- (i) Nets do not exceed a maximum of 10 fathoms or 60 feet and a maximum depth of 60 meshes & 8" Minimum Mesh Restriction with a 3 to 1 hang ratio
- (ii) All Set Nets are identified by a floating buoy prominently displaying the Participant's designation number, and the Participant's designation number is the only numbers displayed on the buoy,
- (iii) All Set Nets fished from poles have buoys attached to the end of the net farthest from the beach by means of a tag line of sufficient length to allow the buoys to be on the surface of the water and clearly visible for inspection at all times.

All harvesters must have a valid Musqueam Fisheries Communal Fishing Card.

Position Summary:

The Safety and Security Female Support Worker, under the supervision and direction of the Security Patrol, provides support to the Security patrol when they are interacting with vulnerable women and youth during the late evening and early morning hours on the Reserve. The Female Support Worker will accompany Security Patrol members on regularly scheduled patrols or on a call-out basis, as determined by need. They will assist in the assessment of individuals encountered on the Reserve with regard to sobriety, vulnerability, health, mental or emotional status. The worker will assist the Patrol member to facilitate the best outcome within the available resources of the Community and the Emergency Services.

Duties:

- Works under the supervision and direction of the on-duty patrol member or Patrol Supervisors.
- Assists vulnerable members of the community who may be unable to care for themselves for a variety of reasons.
- Builds a relationship with, and, assists in the supervision of, minor children at large in the community.
- Liaise with emergency services personnel to determine the best outcome for those needing care
- Produce written statements and reports as required.
- Testify as a witness at legal proceedings when required.
- Works cooperatively with the Community members & Leaseholders.
- Develops and maintains effective working relationships with colleagues and outside agencies.
- Works late evening to early morning shifts
- Available for call-out on short notice
- Maintains accurate and complete notes of all incidents.
- Fills out a Critical Incident form when necessary and informs Security Manager

COMMUNITY CENSUS RECORDERS For the 2016 Musqueam Census

4 Summer Temporary Positions – July/August (8 Weeks) (35 hours/week, with some flexibility)

Position Summary:

Musqueam Chief and Council approved nəċəmat tə šxwqweləwən ct (We are of one heart and mind) – Musqueam's Comprehensive Community Plan (CCP) in 2011. The Community Plan provides leadership, administration, and membership with direction and guidance on how the community develops. As part of the Monitoring and Evaluation phase of the planning cycle, Musqueam is conducting a community Census to track progress towards achieving the community's vision and goals outlined in the CCP.

Reporting to the Planning Assistant and Associate Director of the Treaty, Lands & Resources Department, the Community Census Recorders will engage with Musqueam community members to promote and record responses to the 2016 Musqueam Census. For student applicants, this position is partially funded by the Human Resource and Skills Development Canada – Canada Summer Jobs Program (HRSDC-CSJP). To meet HRSDC-CSJP funding requirements, the applicant must be between 15 and 30 years of age (at the start of employment), have been registered as a full-time student during the preceding academic year, and intend to return to school on a full-time basis in the next academic year. We are also accepting general applications; however, first consideration for these positions will be to student applicants.

Duties:

- Raise community awareness about the Musqueam Census and promote the Census at community events;
- Contact Musqueam members to participate in the Musqueam Census through door-to-door canvassing on-reserve, telephone calls, mail-outs, social media, and emails;
- Conduct Census surveys with on and off-reserve members (over the phone or in-person);
- Transcribe responses to survey questions and input data into survey software;
- Liaise and work collaboratively with other Community Census Recorders;
- Complete related administrative duties.

Qualifications

- Have completed at least 2 years of high school;
- For student applicants: have been registered as a full-time student during the preceding academic year and intend to return to school on a full-time basis in the next academic year.

Skills:

- Effective organizational skills;
- Good reading and writing skills;
- Enjoys working with a range of community members (youth, Elders, etc.) from different families;
- Effective interpersonal, communications, and listening skills;
- Ability to work both independently and within a team environment;

Position Summary:

With guidance and mentorship from a film production team, the Student Production Assistant will be responsible for assisting with a range of filming, interview, and research tasks while receiving mentorship and skills training along the way. This is a great opportunity for a student interested in developing their skills in filmmaking and creating educational resources.

Where Are We in the World? is a film series that features sites around the Lower Mainland shaped by often ignored histories of struggle and agency. The focus of this initiative is to provide a strong foundation to answer the question of "where" the University of British Columbia is located.

The first two films explore Vancouver's Chinatown and the Komagata Maru Incident of 1914. This summer, two new films will be created with a focus on Musqueam Legal Histories and Musqueam-UBC relations.

Staff and advisors from UBC Aboriginal Initiatives, Centre for Teaching, Learning and Technology, First Nations House of Learning, and St. John's College will partner with Musqueam Treaty, Lands, and Resources Department, and Musqueam Language and Culture Department to oversee and advise the development of these films.

This is a part-time position from early June to the end of September.

UPDATE ON LDB PROJECT

THE PARTNERSHIP AND PROJECT

In 2014 the Musqueam Community, at a General Band Meeting, approved the formation of a partnership consisting of the Musqueam Nation, the Squamish Nation, the Tsleil-Waututh Nation, and the Aquilini Investment Group. The partnership was formed to acquire and develop the property that is currently the Liquor Distribution Branch (LDB) on Broadway in Vancouver.

The Partnership will develop the property at LDB for the mutual benefit of all partners. In order to implement this vision, a member from each partnering Nation was hired by Aquilini in March 2016 to act as the Development Coordinator for their First Nation.

Tara Felix was hired as the Development Coordinator for Musqueam and will be working alongside the Musqueam Chief and Council and Musqueam Capital Corporation. The main objective in this position will be to keep our Community informed as the Project progresses through its various stages.

THE LDB UPDATE

Tara will be holding information sessions in the upcoming year to ensure that the Community is informed about the project as it progresses.



This property at 3200 E. Broadway is approximately 36,000 m². We hope to create a mixed-use area that will add value to the neighbourhood in terms of employment and housing while providing sustainable profit for the partnership.

MUSQUEAM'S HEALTH CARE AID PROGRAM FUNDING HAS BEEN APPROVED



The Musqueam Employment & Training department is planning to deliver a Health Care Aide Program in partnership with Langara College. See program summary below.

Program proposed:

a. Training Participants will receive:

The Health Care Aide for the Musqueam Indian Band Certificate Program will follow the Core Competencies Profile for Care Aides and the Health Care Assistant (HCA) Provincial Curriculum, 2008 (Health Care Assistant Program: Provincial Curriculum Guide, 2008, Province of British Columbia) Traditions of Musqueam healing will be threaded throughout the curriculum.

The program will include 475 hours of course theory and laboratory, as well as 270 hours of applied practice experiences, for a total of 745 HCA program hours. Graduates will be eligible to be included in the BC Care Aide Registry listing and recognized as Care Aides throughout the province.

b. Details on how and where services and training will be delivered:

Theory content will be delivered in a class room on the Musqueam land at 6735 Salish Drive, Vancouver, B.C. V6N 4C4. Laboratory components will be delivered in the Langara Nursing Laboratory at 100 West 49th Street in Vancouver. The Nursing Laboratory provides a state of the art nursing laboratory with 22 basic mannequins and 5 specialty mannequins. Clinical Practice will be provided in a public or private health care facility.

If our proposal is approved by the Ministry of Jobs, Tourism and Skills Training, we plan to recruit 12 participants for this program. If you are interested, please register by completing an application form with the Musqueam Employment & Training department at your earliest convenience. If our application is successful, we will need enough lead time to prepare the students for this program.

Students become proficient at creating business documents using MS Word, Excel and Outlook; gain confidence in public speaking through delivering PowerPoint presentations; learn basic bookkeeping and QuickBooks; develop interpersonal relations skills and the essential skills to become adept at managing the roles and responsibilities of the office professional. They will compose and format business documents; organize information, tasks, files and meetings; and learn to become the office go to person for information, organization and planning. Students will also gain skills in networking, interviewing and working with employers in a four-week practicum.

A Construction Craft Worker (Labourer) works mostly on construction sites in residential, institutional, commercial, and industrial settings, including pipelines, utilities, hydroelectric dams, roadways, bridges, tunnels, shipyards, mining and railways. Construction Craft Worker (Labourer) tasks include site preparation and cleanup, setting up and removing excess equipment, and assisting on concrete, masonry, steel, wood and pre-cast erection projects. They handle materials and equipment and perform demolition, excavation and compaction activities. They may also perform site safety and security checks.

CAN WATER HELP ME LIVE LONGER?

So the answer is yes, drinking clean water can help you live longer. On a very basic level, your body cannot store up its own supply of water. It needs fresh intake of valuable water to hydrate cells and remove toxins through your liver and later kidneys. Without this vital replenishing of water, your body dehydrates, slows down and your blood literally 'thickens' as your body releases histamines in an effort to store water up in cells. 
