Block F' Public Meeting

The Manager of the University Endowment Lands will be sending our application for the rezoning of Block F to a 'Public Meeting' on **Tuesday May 31st at the UBC Golf Club**. There will be an **'open house' from 4:30 - 6:30pm** followed by a **formal meeting from 6:30 – 9:30pm**. The meetings are open to the general public and will be advertised to all residents of UEL and the surrounding community. This rezoning is being led by Musqueam Capital Corp. and its consultant team and we encourage all Musqueam members to attend this event and show your support.

The open house will allow the public to view the project 'story boards' along with the scaled model of the completed development and to talk with our team about all aspects of the project. The formal meeting is part of the 'statutory' or required process that allows the Minister of Community Sport and Culture to formally rezone property after considering the comments from the general public at this meeting.

We have been working towards the rezoning of these lands for several years and feel that we are now very close to finalizing this process.

The development incorporates the Preservation and enhancement of open space, Sustainability, Community integration and respect, Housing diversity, Responsible development and Building a community heart. The success of this project will make a significant contribution towards the economic independence of Musqueam. At the same time, it preserves and enhances the natural environment, provides for community, a sense of place that reflects who we are as a nation.

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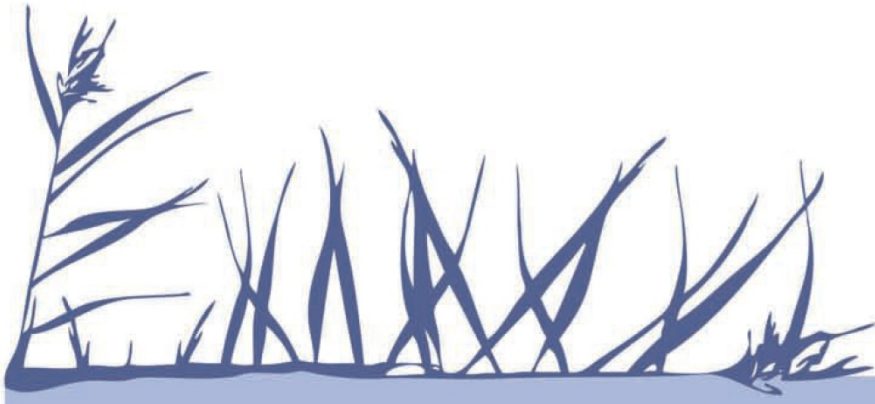

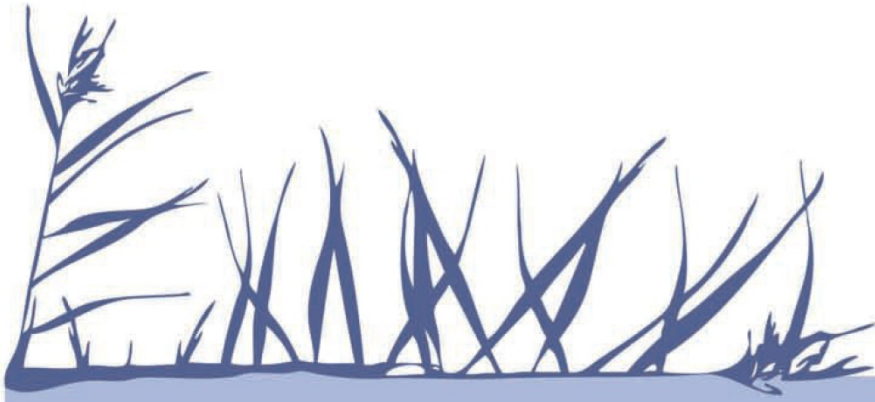
Jim I. Reynolds and Aaron Wilson, are postponing the scheduled Vote Date of June 9, 2016.

Please be advised that effective June 19 2016 the Federal Government's Matrimonial Real Property Law, Bill S-2: Family Homes on Reserves and Matrimonial Rights and Interests (FHMIRA) WILL apply to our Musqueam Indian Band reserve lands until such time as our own customized Musqueam Spousal Property Law is finalized and the Band is operating under the Musqueam Land Code. An information session will be scheduled to inform on FHRMIRA.

Two issues drove the decision to postpone the custom Musqueam Matrimonial Real Property (MRP) Law work. Firstly, questions and issues have arisen in the MRP Consultative process that warrant further work of the Band Council in concert with the Musqueam Lands Department, Musqueam Legal advisor and the Band membership. The plan is to continue the consultative work with Musqueam Band Members to further develop of the customized Matrimonial Real Property Law. A new work plan is underway to complete the development of the MRP Law.

Secondly, the Musqueam Land Code is entrenched with the following five (5) Commencement Preconditions that require further work and finalization

1. *requisite personnel have been hired to administer this Land Code;*
2. *a satisfactory risk management analysis has been conducted and approved by Council;*

3. *satisfactory administrative policies and procedures and systems have been developed and approved by Council;*
4. *an Interim Spousal Property Law has been developed pursuant to section 39.5; and*
5. *adequate insurance is in place.*

A new Musqueam Spousal Property Law work plan will be developed and rescheduled to recommit time and effort to the Commencement Preconditions of the Musqueam Land Code that require completion, prior to the Musqueam Band being deemed ready to proceed “operation” of the Musqueam Administration under our own Musqueam Land Code.

Thank you to each and every Band Member for your insight as to the issues of division of matrimonial real property in the breakdown of a marriage or common law union on Musqueam Indian Reserve Lands.

Please remain ready to reengage on this important issue that impacts each of us Band Members.

**Student Film Production Assistant – Summer Mentorship Placement
June to September 2016**

Position Summary:

With guidance and mentorship from a film production team, the Student Production Assistant will be responsible for assisting with a range of filming, interview, and research tasks while receiving mentorship and skills training along the way. This is a great opportunity for a student interested in developing their skills in filmmaking and creating educational resources.

Where Are We in the World? is a film series that features sites around the Lower Mainland shaped by often ignored histories of struggle and agency. The focus of this initiative is to provide a strong foundation to answer the question of “where” the University of British Columbia is located.

The first two films explore Vancouver’s Chinatown and the Komagata Maru Incident of 1914. This summer, two new films will be created with a focus on Musqueam Legal Histories and Musqueam-UBC relations.

Staff and advisors from UBC Aboriginal Initiatives, Centre for Teaching, Learning and Technology, First Nations House of Learning, and St. John’s College will partner with Musqueam Treaty, Lands, and Resources Department, and Musqueam Language and Culture Department to oversee and advise the development of these films.

This is a part-time position from early June to the end of September.

Duties:

- Assist the director and producer with a variety of tasks, including equipment operation and interview set-up;
- Assist with coordinating and conducting interviews;
- Research supplementary materials in the Musqueam Archives and at UBC;
- Work with the project team to host events at Musqueam;
- Perform other related tasks as required.

- To qualify applicants must be of Musqueam ancestry and be attending or eligible for post-secondary school as an undergraduate student;
- Have an interest in documentary filmmaking;

- Be willing to learn new skills;
- Willingness to learn interviewing skills;
- Have a flexible summer schedule;

- Good time-management skills;
- Good organizational skills;
- Ability to communicate effectively in the workplace and community;

Position Summary:

The Child Care Worker provides a safe, stimulating environment for young children, and conducts individual and group activities to encourage learning and develop social interaction skills. Prepares and/or serves children's meals. Maintains appropriate records of attendance and activities. Ensures the children's hygiene, welfare and safety. As part of the Child Care Centre team, works with the other staff to develop and plan the program activities. Maintains a positive work environment and attitude with children, parents and other Child Care staff.

Duties:

- Program planning and preparation work prior to daily activities (e.g. Field trips and themes of the month)
- Plans and organizes traditional First Nations activities
- Plans, organizes and leads daily activities designed to stimulate the intellectual, physical and emotional growth of the children
- Encourages cooperation and participation of all children; strives to create a happy, caring, creative and respectful environment
- Encourages open communication with parents concerning the needs, progress and problems of their children
- Maintains constant supervision of all indoor and outdoor activities
- Prepares snacks that meet the standards of the Canada Food Guide, and cleans up after meals
- Changes diapers as needed
- Maintains children's attendance records
- Implements proper safety and hygiene practices, reports any unsafe or faulty equipment to the Child Care Supervisor
- Participates in training and development sessions, attends staff meetings
- Performs other related duties as required

Qualifications:

- Skill and knowledge usually attained by successful completion of Secondary School, and an ECE and Infant/Toddler certificates, and 1-2 years' experience in a Child Care setting; or an equivalent combination of skill, knowledge and experience
- Good interpersonal and communication skills

ABORIGINAL YOUTH LEADERSHIP PROGRAM

All CWY programs are open to Canada's Aboriginal youth. CWY also offers programs specifically designed for Aboriginal youth, including some that involve living and working with Aboriginal communities in other countries, with the support of CWY's international and Canadian partners.

The Aboriginal Youth Leadership Program builds on the core components of CWY's youth programming model that has existed for 43 years. It is an asset-based program centered on Aboriginal knowledge and culture and delivered in partnership with Aboriginal communities.

The Aboriginal Youth Leadership Program consists of intensive experiential learning opportunities aimed at providing participants with the knowledge, skills and strategies necessary to prepare them to pursue academic goals and employment and to become catalysts for change through community development and multilateral cooperation regionally, nationally and internationally.

The four pillars of the program include overseas exchanges, youth forums, internships and the United Nations seminars.

1. The International Aboriginal Youth Internships will have 20 interns over the next two years in four communities in Colombia. This initiative is intended to:
 - Provide valuable work experience for Aboriginal youth, raising their employability and/or empowering youth to further their education post-internship;

- Provide opportunities for Aboriginal youth to increase their awareness of, and contribution to, Canada's international development efforts through participation in youth internships with local partner organizations; and
- Build the capacity of Aboriginal youth to promote Canada's international development efforts both in Canada and abroad.

In order to qualify, Aboriginal youth must be between the ages of 18 and 35, and complete a secondary school diploma (or equivalent certification) and/or equivalent work experience related to the internship description. Go to Canadaworldyouth.org to find out more.

Youth exchanges are developed in partnership with international and Canadian partners. These exchanges vary in length and are planned in advance with Aboriginal communities and organizations. The educational approach in exchanges provides an intensive hands-on, self-directed learning in a semi-structured environment and facilitates active participation of youth in all stages of the experience and learning process.

3. The United Nations seminar will provide Aboriginal youth with an annual opportunity for Aboriginal youth to increase their knowledge on the United Nations programs, mechanisms and bodies; Canada's role at the UN; and the Indigenous peoples participation in the UN systems. Each seminar begins with skills training on the United Nations, Indigenous peoples and key issues/priorities affecting Indigenous peoples. The seminar includes additional learning and hands-on experiences with key United Nations events such as the Permanent Forum on Indigenous Peoples annual meeting. Each participant is required to conduct research on issues/themes of interest and prepare a paper to be reviewed by peers. A presentation of the paper is done by the youth in a public forum and/or is published.

4. Youth forums provide training opportunities and workshops in a conference setting on issues and themes affecting Aboriginal youth. The forum is also a gathering of youth to discuss and participate in learning activities and is supported by experts within a given field. The forum is an opportunity for youth to work together in dialogue to shape and direct issues and themes important to Aboriginal youth and establish networks of mutual interest and support.

Like these more obviously dangerous drugs, marijuana can have a significant negative effect on teen brain development. Plus, studies have shown an association between marijuana use and anxiety, depression, suicidal thoughts, and schizophrenia.

What is a drinking water advisory?

Drinking water advisories are preventive measures to protect public health from waterborne contaminants that could be, or are known to be, present in drinking water. They include boil water advisories and "do not drink" advisories.

Boil water advisories are a way to advise the public that they should boil their tap water for drinking and for other uses, such as brushing teeth.

Do not drink advisories are a way to advise the public that they should use an alternative source of drinking water, like bottled water, for drinking and for other uses.

It should be noted that boil water orders, issued under provincial legislation, are common across Canada in small and remote communities.






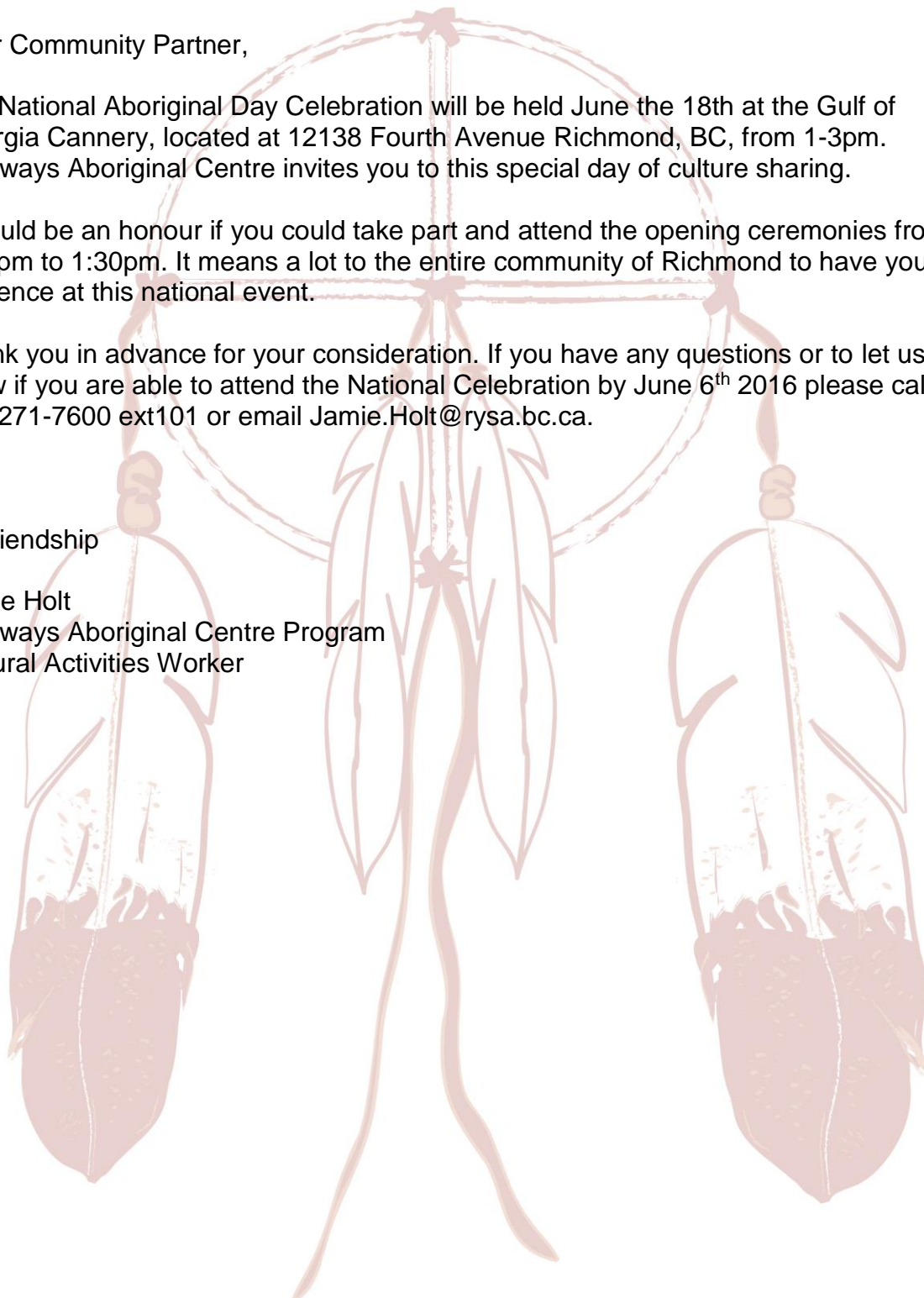

- Small amounts of oil and fat (soaked in paper towel or newspaper)
- Teabags, coffee grounds, and filters
- Tissue paper (no blood or fecal matter)

Food-soiled paper products

- Empty cereal boxes (no plastic liners)
- Paper bags (for lining kitchen containers, such as Bag-to-Earth)
- Paper napkins
- Parchment and wax paper
- Pizza boxes
- Newspaper (for wrapping food scraps or lining kitchen containers)
- Used paper dishes (no plastic coating)

Yard trimmings

- Leaves and grass clippings
- Short branches and prunings (under 10 cm thick and 50 cm long)
- Weeds, plants, and flowers

These items are not accepted and should be recycled or safely disposed of

Fecal matter


- Animal waste
- Diapers

Large or heavy items

- Branches or prunings over 10 cm thick and 50 cm long
- Lumber or other wood products
- Rocks, soil, or sod

Plastics

- Compostable or biodegradable plastic bags
- Plastic bags, wrap, or containers
- Products made of Polylactic Acid (PLA) (containers, disposable plates, cutlery)

 If we find banned items in your Green Bin, your food scraps and yard waste may not get collected. Please remove any banned items so we can pick up your Green Bin next time.
